 No one's been jailed or murdered for being straight. That's a safety and privilege many 2SLGBTQIA+ folks have never had.

 No one protests straight weddings. There's no "God Hates Straights" picket line outside your chapel.

 There is no straight conversion therapy. No one's sending their kid to be "fixed" for being straight.

No one has to come out as straight. You're assumed straight until proven otherwise — which makes the rest of us have to come out.
